From Madelyn Cirrina: An overview of an Agility Trial and why so many volunteers are needed:

Agility trials require many workers for each class: there are Standard classes of Excellent, Open, Novice and Jumpers with Weaves classes with Excellent, Open & Novice and a Premier Class each day, meaning 7 classes. There are jump height divisions of 4,8, 12, 16, 20, 24, 26 for each class. Those are often grouped such as 4, 8, 12 all together; 16; and 20-24 together and the Open and Novice classes are often small in competitors thus only one crew is needed. For jobs required there needs to be: a Scribe or score keeper (need knowledge of judge's signals), Assistant scribe who needs to make sure the scribe has the correct sheet for the dog running, Timer who understands the electronic timer box but generally it is all set up, 3 Ring Crew that set bars that get knocked by a dog and change the heights as needed (because 3 people only a few jumps for each person to set), one person to Straighten the Chute in Standard classes (this requires getting up and leaning down after each dog runs; one person to Walk the Leash from one end of the ring to the other as each dog runs; and a Score Runner who takes the scores to from the scoring table to the computer person entering each score run, and a Ribbon person who takes the results and puts them in the score books and sometimes attaches labels to correct ribbon(sometimes it is "self serve" and competitors do this). As you can see, a smoothly run trial depends on many people volunteering. Most classes and heights last for less than an hour, since the runs are about a minute in standard classes and 40 seconds in jumpers, and the divisions are fairly equal.

The following is a post to Facebook by Becky Jarit, Shaizach Shelties. Becky gave permission to have this shared with breed clubs thru their newsletters.

The AKC Kennel Inspection Experience

As a way to help my breeder friends who use AKC to register dogs, I'm using Facebook this evening for something other than mindless browsing of photos of fairy tale FB events and fluffed up puppies. For friends who are not breeders forgive my utilitarian use of this normally "social" network for something practical and scroll right on by my boring tips following today's AKC inspection... But for you breeders pay attention if you have never been inspected, it could be you next!!

1. Why the inspection? Who knows is the answer because could be a couple of things but what probably flagged it was, in addition to the 6 bitches I own here, I co-own a small group of bitches between a few respected breeder friends. Those bitches were bred this year along with a few I bred here, a few were bred 2x in one year. The number that flags you is just 7 litters in one year, so that's likely why the inspection. But I found from AKC that the other reason is if someone complains formally. They have to leave a name with their complaint but AKC never tells the person being inspected that there was a complaint so you won't know which reason. Out of curiosity I asked what complaints they get and he said frequently they get complaints from buyers who are angry that the breeder is not sending their paperwork, so here's a tip **SEND** them their paperwork right away when they ask for it or when you said you would. Second most common complaint is condition of premises or dogs from puppy buyers. Don't let them come on a day when you are not clean and organized.

2. **USE** an AKC Litter Record paper for **EVERY** litter. Fill it out immediately as the buyer is there to give you the info and don't fall behind, just do it right away all the time and it will never be a problem if they knocked on your door tomorrow. Because they don't always give notice and could show up unannounced. If you have litters that are born with a co-owner, it doesn't matter to AKC, you are required to have a litter record regardless of where the dam lives. So get it from co-owners. **EVERY** litter no matter where it lives, if it has your name on it get it and file it with the dams file that you should have. Again, don't get behind, do it in a timely way each litter and you won't be looking all over creation for paperwork on a litter you barely remember, born somewhere else 5 years ago, when the AKC knocks at your door. The inspector pulled 9 random litters born in the past 6 years that had my name on them and asked to see the litter record and all 9 were here and quickly supplied. Some were litters I never saw that were born with co-owners. Good thing I had asked the co-owners for those records and filed them properly.

3. He asked for records of 8 random dogs that had been registered in the last six years with my name, to see their individual records. Two of those I had the registration in my name for only weeks! About half I did not own any more and hadn't for several years. Some had always lived with the co-owner. Every dog, whether it's old, spayed/neutered now, lives with you or it never did, whether it was bred or never bred, regardless, must have an individual record/file if it was ever registered with your name on it as an owner. So if you grew a puppy only months, weeks, or even minutes but, in that time, registered it to yourself or the co-owner registered in your names, and then it's spayed and sold as a pet, you still must have an individual record/file for that one. USE the AKC template (found in downloadable forms on AKC site) for Individual Record/Ownership (Dog or Bitch) and have one for every single dog that has ever been in your name. It's what AKC wants. It has space for if the dog is no longer in your name for you to record when that changed and to who it now belongs. Keep the forms in individual files marked clearly with the dog's name, to easily find it. Again, doesn't matter if the co-owner sold or placed it, even if it never lived with you, you never saw it, still you're responsible for knowing exactly where it went, name, address and phone number and the date it went. They could ask for as long as 6 or 7 years back so don't throw out old records too quickly.

4. If your dogs are not ALL micro-chipped get them all chipped. It's not expensive, it is easy, takes seconds, and it makes AKC inspectors very happy. You are not in compliance if you have any dogs at your place who are registered but not permanently identified. You will get fined or get your privileges put on hold until you are in compliance. This is an easy one.

5. Luckily I did my homework prior to the visit and was ready but did you know that litters, each must have clearly visible a label or ID of the litter information on their whelping box or ex-pen that includes the registered name and AKC number of the sire and dam of the litter, number of puppies, males/females, markings identifying them and date of birth? And you must never put puppies together if they are close in age and it's not quickly and clearly obvious to a stranger which puppies are from which litter, like if they are all sable and close in age. AKC would require DNA on both litters and you'd be held from privileges until it's straightened out to their satisfaction. Again, I did homework ahead and all was fine but I used to do this all the time because I could tell them apart easily but that doesn't matter, an outsider (inspector!!) would have to be able to tell and they would have to have visible written labels that describe their markings and AKC info etc...that shows which litter is which.

6. Dog care and inspection of premises is stuff that my breeder friends should all find obvious and doubt any of you would have problems with the kind of things they are looking for. Fresh water, enough food on premises to feed number of dogs there, enough room for number of dogs to exercise properly, free of parasites, correct weight not overly thin or fat, clean crates/kennels, fresh air /ventilation, coats not matted, etc...

Well, that is all I can think of for tips and info about the inspections. I thought it was important to share. I was stressed over this inspection but I was just fine since I have been really good over the years about keeping records and of course the dogs and their living conditions were not an issue. But still I was stressed and I think it will help some of you to know exactly what they are looking for.

Happy to answer any questions !! and VERY glad the inspection is over although it really wasn't bad at all. I was ready!

The following snippets are part of the conversation that resulted from Becky's tale of her inspection. I have tried to edit them to use following her presentation as they have some valuable information. Ye editor

The other newer requirement is to have a written Disaster Plan. I was asked about that on my last inspection. AKC has a long list of questions that must be covered in your Plan. that is the only part of the inspection that I did not pass. I did not have a visibly posted Disaster Plan. He gave me info on what it needs to contain and said i need to do it asap but he didnt make a big thing of it said since it is my first inspection since breeding my first litter 23 years ago I would not have known.

There is a downloadable / printable 10 page document on AKC website called Dog Ownership and Breeding Records

The document for Emergency Plan is called Developing an Emergency or Disaster Preparedness Plan



And here is a valuable tip:

[Jon Woodring](#) An awesome post Becky. Another thing I do if inspected, is I go to www.akc.org , then click on "My AKC", and print the breeding record for each dog. That gives me an individual record for each dog. I keep that in a plastic "Page protector", that I have one for each dog. I have found the AKC inspectors to be OK people, Nice, professional but not jerks. I feel that their goal is NOT to fail people but to make sure that the dogs can be identified, and that the record keeping is good. I think if you have any slight problem, that you get a warning and they give you time to correct it. I agree with Becky about the importance of Microchipping, that is one of the main things that they look for. I used to dread an inspection, but I don't any more. If one keeps the records up to date, and microchips, then the majority of your akc requirements are already done.

Many of us may never come under the scrutiny of the AKC inspection team....but it is interesting to see how this procedure works. Ye editor





A Feel Good Story

Helfgott-Turner Productions, Inc. announces the start of an historic crowd-funding campaign to make the first motion picture celebrating the world of dog shows, and showing the incredible love and magical bond people have with their dogs. In 1980, a young girl, Trish Kanzler, with no money and no backing, won Best in Show at Westminster with Cinnar, a red Siberian whose ear was bitten off! The story of how she got there - and her incredible journey with Cinnar - is a real life fairy tale.

Helfgott-Turner Productions, award winning TV and movie writer/producers, have brought together an amazing team of filmmakers. The entire team has spent their careers helping to turn great stories into films, and all four of them are dog owner and dog lovers. In fact, it was a dog who started this entire project. When the Producers' last dog passed away, they searched for a new puppy. It was that young dog, an adorable Tibetan Terrier they named Kipling, who got them interested in the world of dog shows. It was a world they had never experienced before, but they were hooked! On Kipling's way to becoming a Grand Champion, they heard people talking about Trish Kanzler and Cinnar. And when they found out that Hollywood had never made an uplifting and positive film about this sport, they knew they had to be the ones to do it.

The project is endorsed by Wayne Ferguson, President of the Kennel Club of Philadelphia which sponsors the National Dog Show, Mari-Beth O'Neill, Vice President of the AKC and head of the charity "Take the Lead", and top US and Canadian Judge James G. Reynolds, who all believe that this movie will help the sport. In fact, a portion of the movie's profits will go to support the charity, Take The Lead.

The producers are working directly with the real person, Trish Kanzler, and her kennel, Innisfree Kennels. Trish is providing maple syrup from her own farm as one of the campaign rewards. Trish says "I support this film because I believe it will encourage young people to go into the sport." She also believes the movie highlights that this is the one sport where anyone can compete -- rich or poor, young or old, able-bodied or physically challenged, professional or amateur.

Unique rewards especially for dog lovers will be offered as part of the Kickstarter crowd-funding campaign, but the one that seems to have dog lovers excited the most is the opportunity for you and your dog to be in the movie. A few of these will actually involve the chance to be at Westminster (at least in the movie) and even get into the ring for Best in Show. The Producers are launching this historic Kickstarter campaign because they found resistance from Hollywood. Producer Daniel Helfgott says, "The studios don't believe dog lovers want an inspirational family movie." Helfgott-Turner Productions decided to go directly to the Dog Show World and Dog Lovers everywhere for support. The Producers have started their pre-launch campaign and are asking dog show supporters and dog lovers of all kinds to sign up and encourage their friends to sign up for the newsletter at www.ALittleMagictheMovie.com. They need everyone to support the crowd-funding campaign that goes live on January 25th. By signing up, everyone will also learn more about the movie project and how they can participate in the fun, including how they can put THEIR dogs in the movie!

Bits and Pieces via Sue Burrell, Burrell Handling

- There are 71 shows in Springfield in 2016. The parking fee for each show is \$5.00. If you only enter 20 of those shows (approx. 1/3) your parking fees will be \$100! Springfield/BIG E does offer a one-year parking pass for **\$55!!** Something to consider - would make a great Holiday gift
- When traveling to shows, please be aware that Motel 6 is dog friendly and offers discounts for us show-goers. AARP discount is 10% and includes free WiFi and late checkout if requested. AKC discount is also 10% (for all you young people). You need to use #CP542764 when you make your reservation.
- When you're training your dogs, teach them "watch me". Make them make eye contact with you and give them calm, quiet praise instead of a cookie. When your dog gets stressed, make it watch you instead of what's scary to build the dog's confidence and trust in you as a kind boss.
- It is always a good idea to send in your entries early/as soon as you know you will be going to the show. This can give you several advantages over your fellow exhibitors. First, you will have a lower armband number so you can hopefully be first in the ring. That would mean that your dog is the first one the judge sees coming into the ring and also the one he sees the most. If you are first in that means on the group "take them around" you get to set the pace/control the speed. Some judges judge the first dog and then compare all the other dogs to it. Have confidence that your dog is the best and perhaps the judge will think so, too!


